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





Hol Chan was established as a marine reserve by the Government of Belize on May 2nd, 1987. Hol Chan consists of four zones – Zone A, B, C, D. Zone D of the reserve, Shark Ray Alley was officially declared on August 31st, 1999. Due to its protected status, what was once a depleted fishing area has now been allowed to re-generate, providing an unparalleled diving and snorkeling experience for visitors and an important refuge for marine life along the northern section of the Belize Barrier Reef.

Snorklers enjoy visiting the reserve, since they can see a huge variety of marine life unavailable in other snorkel sites; however, divers can view a little more!

Divers need to be cautious though, of the strong out-Continued on page 5

going currents that can be found at times at Hol Chan. Because it is such a narrow deep channel, tremendous volumes of water are tunneled through it from the outer reef lagoon during outgoing tides. This hydraulic effect can produce strong currents and snorkelers and divers should pay attention to these currents.

Under the cave overhangs in Hol Chan, divers should look out for the very pretty Royal Fairy Basslets - *Gramma loretto* (these are two to three inches long, the front half of its body and head are a bright purple to violet, while the back half is a striking and vibrant yellow). Hol Chan is also the habitat of a large moray eel population. With five different morays, the Green Moray (Gymnothorax funebris) is the largest, up to six feet long. Note: OBSERVE BUT DO NOT PROVOKE, THEIR BITE IS A NASTY ONE.

Diving can be enjoyed not only inside the reef, but outside as well. Bottom composition of the outside of the reef is mainly of coral canyons extending out like long fingers from the barrier reef. This canyon phenomenon is caused by the motion of the water against the reef. On both dives one can note an abundance of huge fish. The Hol Chan dive is teeming with many of the fish overflowing from the inside park and is colorful and highly interesting. It is not unusual in this area to spot schools of rays floating in the distance, or even schools of barracudas. The fish are pretty friendly and "hang

around" out of curiosity. In fact, some are extroverts and may come right up to your mask to view you. Some of the fish are so friendly, they will stay around to be petted or may even come up and "kiss" your mask.

Surface interval between dives is usually done in the "inside" area of the park where calmer waters prevail. You can have something to eat (or drink) or plunge into the shallow water and snorkel off for a bit and explore the awesome wonders of the shallow waters before the next dive.

The highlight of the second dive trip is the Wreck dive. The "wreck" is really a sunken barge about 30 feet long located in approximately 80 feet of water. The main feature of this dive, though, is not necessarily the "wreck" but the fact that on this dive you are GUARANTEED to see sharks. A colony of curious nurse

sharks make this wreck their home, as well as a friendly green moray that lives in the front part of the barge. Pet the eel if you dare, but remember that these are still creatures of the wild. Enjoy them. There are not many places in the world where this will happen.

Please respect the wildlife. You are on their territory. Enjoy and bask in the pleasure and enjoyment of being on the same level with these awesome creatures. Enjoy your dive!!

"Heart of the Maya" and boasts the highest concentration of Maya sites among all Central American countries. To truly appreciate the beauty of the Maya sites, tools, and artifacts, you must appreciate the beauty of the Maya people, for it is within their past that Belize's ancient history unfolds. One area that has been the center of attention lately, has been the discovery of many Mayan objects. One in particular is the discovery of the Jade Head.

The bottlenose dolphin

Nothing is more delightful than spotting bottlenose dolphins as they accompany your fast moving vessel, maneuvering with astounding speed and poetic grace, they seem to escort you into the deep blue sea. At times, these "bow riders" like to hitch a ride on the bow wave in front of the boat, surfing the pressure created in front of the moving ship. Or, you may have the fortune of watching these incredible creatures of the Caribbean from the beach as they frolic in the shallow waters. Regardless of the occasion, when you witness these animals in the wild, you feel as if you have been given a gift from King Neptune himself.

The bottlenose dolphin, (tursiops truncatuss), belongs to the cetacean order (group) of mammals made up of whales, dolphins and porpoises. Cetaceans bear their young alive, and the babies nurse on the mother's milk. Cetaceans live entirely in water and breathe air through lungs. Their fish-

like bodies have a thick layer of fat called blubber that keeps them warm. Cetaceans have flippers for front limbs. They have no hind limbs and almost no hair. The bottlenose dolphin is perhaps one of the most well known cetaceans because of its widespread use in marine parks, research facilities and as "Flipper" in the popular television series.

The bottlenose dolphin grows to be at most 12 feet (3.7 meters) long, sometimes weighing more than 1,400 pounds (635 kg). Most are smaller than this, and males are significantly larger than females. Bottlenose dolphins have streamlined bodies and a rounded head with a distinctive beak. They have a

tall, falcate (sickle-shaped) dorsal fin and broad, slightly pointed flippers. Some sharks (including <u>tiger sharks</u>, dusky sharks and <u>bull sharks</u>) and <u>Orcas</u> will prey upon dolphins.

Bottlenose dolphins are hunters that fish mostly at the surface of the water, eating mostly fish and squid. Feeding behaviors are diverse, primarily involving individual prey capture, but sometimes involving coordinated efforts to catch food, feeding in association with human fishing and chasing fish into mud banks. An adult bottlenose dolphin may consume 15-30 pounds (8-15 kilograms) of food each day. They have many pairs of Continued on page 11



sharp, pointed teeth distributed in both the upper and lower jaws.

Bottlenose dolphins are found worldwide in temperate and tropical waters, absent only from 45 degrees poleward in either hemisphere. They are frequently seen in harbors, bays, lagoons, estuaries, and river mouths. There appear to be two ecotypes: a coastal form and an offshore form. Population density appears to be higher nearshore. Biochemical studies now are providing more information about the relationship within and between the ecotypes. In some areas, dolphins have limited home ranges; in others, they are migratory.

Based on a number of studies of nearshore populations, bottlenose dolphins seem to live in relatively open societies. Mother and calf bonds and some other associations may be strong, but individuals may be seen from day-to-day with a variety of different associates. Group size is often less than 20 nearshore; offshore groups of several hundred have been seen. Much of what we know of the general biology of dolphins comes from studies of bottlenose dolphins, both in captivity and in the wild.

The bottlenose dolphin is protected in U.S. waters by the Marine Mammal Protection Act. Bottlenose dolphins are still generally plentiful in numbers, but are near depletion in some areas. Both incidental and direct exploitation of bottlenose dolphins are known to occur, generally at low to moderate levels. The largest direct

kills have traditionally been in the Black Sea, where Russian and Turkish hunters apparently have reduced local populations. Bottlenose dolphins are accidentally caught in a variety of fishing gear, including gillnets, purse seiners used to catch tuna, and shrimp trawls. These dolphins also are occasional victims of harpoon and drive fisheries. Live captures of bottlenose dolphins for captivity have

had effects on some local dolphin populations in the Gulf of Mexico and southeastern United States, but no commercial live captures have occurred in the U.S. since the 1980's.

Bottlenose dolphins are vulnerable to pollution, habitat alteration, boat collisions, human feeding of and swimming with wild animals, and human disturbance (such as boating). Several die-offs of bottlenose dolphins have occurred.

credit for its findings, the discovery was made at the Altun Ha Ruin, where at the time Pendergast led an excavation project. Altun Ha which means "Water of the Rock" consists of two main plazas surrounded by thirteen temples and residential structures. Once functioning as a coastal trade center, the ruins of Altun Ha are quite famous. It was here the Jade Head representing the Sun God, Kinich Ahau, was found. Almost 6 inches tall and weighing nearly 10 pounds, the Jade Head is both the largest carved jade object in the entire Maya area, as well as, the national symbol of Belize. Although there have been different stories of who discovered such artifact, the historical and academic glory go to Dr. Pendergast. Now, Upon its return to the country of Belize, the jade head was put on display in an upper room of what is now the Belize Bank building in Belize City. The Jade Head has been an ambassador of Belize, being shipped through courier to countries like Trinidad and Tobago and the United States throughout the seventies. At an unpublicized date, however, it followed the course of previous government workers and retired from public office to a secured and

on the importance and significance of the objects and research concludes that the object represents a Maya god. It depicts the Sun God which is known as Kunich A'hau in Maya. Kunich is day, so the passing of a sun is like the passing of a day and A'hau is lord. This is known because there are some carvings that one can find on every depiction of the sun god: on the forehead, one can see the little eyes and

point that makes it out to be the Sun God, is that it has a little serpent right around his mouth. Archeologist Dr. Jaime Awe stated, "It is an incredible piece of art because it was carved out of one piece of solid jade, it is still the largest three dimensional carved jade object found in the Maya world." There are other things that are unique about it, jade is one of the hardest stones to carve and these people used stone tools to carve this, and it did not take them days, weeks or months, the artist who made this was not only gifted, but took them years to finish it. Dr. Jaime further

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

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

stated "this object is one of these symbols of the past, this is one of the objects that reflect our national identity as a people and as a country and it is important that people know it is here in Belize and that we continue to make every effort to ensure that it will be

here a hundred generations from now.

Belize can now boast and say that it is the only country that holds a rare piece of Maya treasure that was buried deep beneath us. No other discoveries have been recorded or made in any other countries. A flawless double of the Jade Head that is made out of fiberglass can be seen in a glass shelf at the Belize Museum.

Summer is often a time when students are bored and wish they had a little more adventure in their lives. Well, Hol Chan Marine Reserve and Smith College have come together for the 6th year to help bring adventure to the lives of 7-11 year olds through the Coral Ed-Ventures program. Ashley, Elizabeth, Emily, Katie, Maria and Nora have come from Smith College in Massachusetts, USA to work with the Hol Chan Community Outreach **Coordinator Cordelia Shal to present** two weeks full of fun and educational activities relating to the coral reef and conservation.

The students participate in activities around a theme and rotate through the different activities with students their same age. On July 5, the classroom was packed with around 90 students. The theme for the day was water. There was one activity that taught the students about the water cycle and they read a story about how the water cycle works. 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

Trivia Tidbits - All about dolphins

*The scientific family name for dolphins is Delphinidae. The largest dolphins are Orcas, also called killer whales.

*Bottlenose dolphins look like they might be grinning. Their "smiles" are formed by the way their mouths curve.

*Having little or no sense of smell, bottlenose dolphins make up for it with a sharp sense of hearing.

*Bottlenose dolphins have excellent vision both in and out of water.

*The brain of a bottlenose dolphin is larger than a human brain, however, the part concerned with intelligence is not.

*Females give birth every two to three years, normally to one calf after a pregnancy of one year. The calves are often born tail first so they don't drown.

*When born, a bottlenose calf is approximately 3 to 4 feet (.9 to 1 meter) long and weighs about 44 pounds (20 kilograms).

*A calf nurses while underwater and continues nursing for up to 18 months.

*Bottlenose dolphins swim in groups called pods. A pod usually has a dozen or so animals.

*Dolphins will eat almost any kind of fish. Their diets also include squid and small crustaceans such as shrimps. They don't chew their food—they swallow it whole.

*They have been known to approach boats and people in the water in a seemingly friendly fashion, letting themselves be touched.

*Their skin is smooth and feels sort of like an inner tube.

*Males are larger than females and can be as long as 13 feet (4 meters) and weigh more than a thousand pounds (454 kilograms).

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
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
