

Earth, thought of as flat by the Maya, rode on the back of a giant crocodile resting in a pool of water lilies. The crocodile's counterpart in the sky was a double-headed serpent - a concept probably based on the fact that the Maya word for "sky" is similar to the word for "snake". In hieroglyphics, the body of the sky-serpent is marked not only with its own sign of crossed bands, but also those of the Sun, the Moon, Venus and other celestial bodies.






# The King of all Pirates – Sir Henry Morgan

Buccaneer and pirate, admiral and general, country gentleman and planter, judge of the court of Vice-Admiralty, governor and knight. All were titles held by perhaps the most famous of the buccaneers, Sir Henry Morgan. Morgan was born in 1635 in Wales. In his teens he joined a pirate crew from Tortuga and swore an oath as a member of the "Brethren of the Coast." In 1668 Morgan made two pirating ventures. Morgan's attack on the inland city of Puerto Principe, Cuba, was considered his first major attack. Unfortunately for Morgan, his crew of pirates were ambushed along the way, and they only managed to take the city after bitter struggle and great loss. It was at this time that Henry Morgan began his overwhelming pirate career.

Months later, Morgan embarked on a difficult and daring escapade involving a long and dangerous journey through the unexplored jungles of Granada. This expedition was followed by a triumphant lightning as-

sault on Gran Granada. The attack yielded enormous spoils, and was considered a great success for Henry Morgan. He was pleasantly surprised upon his return to Jamaica where the island had a newly appointed commander of all English troops in the West Indies. This new commander was Henry Morgan's uncle, Edward Morgan. After the death of his uncle, the governor of Jamaica chose Henry Morgan to become the commander of the militia in Port Royal. By 1668 Henry Morgan was already an English vice admiral of a fleet of 15 ships. At the same time, pirates elected Henry Morgan to become the successor to Edward Mansfield (leader of all pirate activities in Jamaica). As an English officer and pirate general, Henry Morgan became the terror of all Spaniards in the West Indies.

After the attack on Puerto Principle, half of Morgan's crew quit.. Morgan was not discouraged and he announced plans for attacking the great treasure city of Porto Bello, Panama. Experienced sea pirates scoffed at the plan: Porto Bello was larger, better fortified, and had an army troop when compared to Puerto Principle. Morgan, however, had a plan. When he attacked Porto Bello, he arrived on canoes. Silently and under the cover of darkness, Morgan's men slipped into the harbor before anyone knew they were there. The first two forts of Porto Bello both fell quickly, but the third

withstood each attack the pirates implemented. Morgan finally devised a sinister plan, he used captured catholic priests and nuns to shield his crew as they climbed the walls of the fort. It was only a matter of time before the city fell into the hands of Henry Morgan, along with 250,000 pieces of eight, and 300 slaves. When word of this attack spread, Morgan's force swelled to 15 ships and 900 men. Henry Morgan was quickly known by the nickname: Morgan "the terrible".

A year later Morgan led an expedition of 8 ships and 650 buccaneers to attack the Venezuelan cities of Maracaibo (a coastal city located at the mouth of an inland lake) and Gilbraltar (located on the other side of the lake). Compared with his last venture, the plunder was not comparable, and Morgan found the cities virtually deserted. The result, he gained 50,000 English pounds, slaves, and goods of the same value. When the pirates tried to sail from the lake, they found that their exit had been blocked. Maracaibo's powerful fort had their gun trained on Morgan, and three huge Spanish Men-of-War stood just outside the channel. Morgan offered the Spanish the option of surrender, instead of accepting, the Spanish laughed. Morgan decided to teach them a lesson they would, indeed, never forget. Morgan had his lead ship (a small sloop, covered with pitch, tar, and brimstone) loaded with kegs of gunpowder, and dummies (made of pumpkins and wood, dressed as buccaneers) placed at battle stations throughout his ship. While the Spanish still laughed, the small vessel slowly approached them and suddenly burst into flames, exploding and sinking the first Man-of-

Captain Morgan was widely known for his cruelty and heartlessness when dealing with his slaves and captives. Perhaps this was as a result of himself having been kidnapped as a boy from Bristol. His captors shipped him to the EnglishWest Indies colony of Barbados where he was sold as a slave boy to a plantation owner.

Warwhile burning the second to the hull. As a result the Spanish moved their cannon to the other side of the fort. Before the Spanish had a chance to move the cannon back into place, Morgan took advantage of the opportunity by safely sailing past the fort that night. After this battle, Henry Morgan was the undisputed king of the buccaneers.

In January 1670, Morgan set out after the largest venture of his career, to plunder the gold of Panama. Answering his call, 2,000 buccaneers on 36 ships assembled to prepare for an attack on Panama. Once Morgan took over Fort San Lorenzo, he led his crew on a rough 16-day journey through dense almost impassable

Jungle. The Spaniards were prepared for Morgan, and six hundred cavalry swooped down on the pirates. Thousands of muskets fired; both sides took their losses, but the pirates held their ground. A stampede of 2,000 Spanish bulls did not deter the pirates, and the Spanish finally fled in retreat. The city belonged to the buccaneers, and vielded 100,000 English Pounds. Unfortunately, at that time, England was no longer at war with Spain. Morgan was recalled to England and thrown into the dungeons to stand trial as a pirate. However, King Charles II, learning about Morgan's great deeds, instead knighted him in 1673, making him lieutenant governor of Jamaica. Morgan was ordered to rid

the seas from all buccaneers.

Morgan's legacy ended when he died in 1688, by that time, there were almost no buccaneers left. Henry Morgan was one of the most ruthless

of pirates, his daring, brutality, and intelligence made him the most feared, and respected buccaneer of all time. Henry Morgan truly was the king of all pirates.









# Maya Astronomy

#### Venus, the most important celestial body

Approximately one millennium before Archbishop Usher of Armagh concluded that creation occurred at 4004 B.C., the Mayans had calculated that the cosmos were 90 million years old. Like other pre-Columbian civili-




The Maya believed the Earth was flat with four corners representing a cardinal direction, represented by a bacab, or Jaguar head.

zations, the Maya had a profound knowledge of the sky. The Mayan practice of astronomy was relegated to the ilhuica tlamatilizmatini, or "wise man who studies heaven". These priest-astronomers had a great amount of power, given the fact that they could essentially 'predict' the future. They recorded astronomical observations and the result was an extremely accurate calendar that predicted the coming of eclipses and the revolutions of Venus to an error of one day in 6,000 years. This information was then passed down from generation to generation. Their knowledge of the patterns of the sky, and of the mathematics that solves more complex patterns, led them to an exalted position in Mayan society. Priest-astronomers spent the dark hours determining the time of night. Of course, the length of the days varies substantially from season to season, and therefore the as-

tronomers had to be very knowledgeable about the sky in order to know the hour and to predict when the sun would rise again. Mayan astronomers officially began the day at sunrise, although for some Mayans the day began at either noontime, when the sun was at its highest point, or at sunset. Starting the day at these times may seem strange to those of us conditioned to a western view of time. However, our own time is relatively unusual: we start the day when the sun is almost at its anti-zenith, when it is at its highest point on exactly the other side of the Earth!


As accomplished astronomers, the Maya's primary interest (in contrast to "western" astronomers), were Zenial Passages, which is when the Sun crossed over the Maya latitudes. On an annual basis the sun travels to its summer solstice point or the latitude of 23-1/3 degrees north. Most of the Maya cities were located south of this latitude, meaning that they could observe the sun directly overhead during the time that the sun was passing over their latitude. This happened



An astronomer at work in a observatory. He uses a pair of crossed sticks set up in a window or doorway to determine the position of a star.


twice a year, evenly spaced around the day of solstice. The Maya could easily determine these dates, because at local noon, they cast no shadow. Zenial passage observations are possible only in the tropics, and were quite unknown to the Spanish conquistadors who descended upon the Yucatan peninsula in the 16th century.

The Maya believed the Earth was flat with four corners. Each corner represented a cardinal direction. Each direction had a color: east-red; north-white; westblack; south-yellow. Green was the center. At each corner, there was a jaguar of a different color that supported the sky. The jaguars were called bacabs. Mayans believed that four jaguars held up the sky. The Maya had a god to represent the position of the Sun, called the Diving God.

The priest-astronomers recorded Mayan cosmology observations and calculations of astronomical phenomena. The most common form of documentation was writing in highly perishable books that they made from bark paper, coated with lime to make a fresh white surface. These "books" were screen-

folded and bound with wood and deer hide. They are called codices, codex is singular. Because of their perishable nature and zealous Spanish book burning, only four codices remain to day. The Dresden Codex contains calendrical data, written in the Mayan dating system, concerning astronomical data and the sky mechanics, and tables of multiple integers that are to

be used for calculations of planetary movements and tropical years, next to the hieroglyphic texts and numerous depictions of Mayan gods and ritual scenes. In the Dresden Codex, the Maya had an almanac that displayed the full cycle of Venus. They counted five sets of 584 days, which is 2,920 days, or approximately eight years or five repetitions of the Venus cycle. Venus is represented as a figure with two masks, symbolizing its appearance in the early morning and evening.

Venus was considered the most important celestial body observed by the Maya, who called it Chak ek, "the Great Star", possibly more important even than the Sun. The Mayans moni-**Continued on Page 7**



Kayabim (Maya)

Scientific Name: Neurolaena lobata

**Plant Family**: Asteraceae

**Description**: Herb growing one to four meters tall, with few main stems and numerous branches on each stem; leaves often with three distinctive points (hence the Spanish name), bitter tasting; flowers yellow.

**Habitat**: Clearings, roadsides, fields and pastures.

Traditional Uses: Entire plant is a highly respected medicinal used to treat and prevent a variety of parasitic ailments such as malaria, fungus, ringworm, amoebas, intestinal parasites, and boring organisms such as beef worm or screwworm. Tea is an excellent vaginal douche for leukhorrea and itching, and to bathe stubborn wounds or infections; it is also used to wash hair to kill

head lice. Boiled, strained leaves can be used as insecticide or fungicide on diseased plants in house or garden. Leaves are toasted and powdered to use as wound powder applied directly to sores, fungus and infections. Roots are boiled and drunk as blood cleanser. For teas, boil fresh leaf for each cup of water for 10 minutes; drink one to three cups daily for intestinal parasites. For baths, use one handful of leaves boiled to one gallon of water for 10 minutes; cool to warm and bathe area. Fresh juice from crushed leaves may be applied directly to wounds, sores, and skin conditions such as fungus.

Research Results: There is surprisingly little information about this plant in the pharmacological literature, relative to its importance in folk medicine. An

ethanol extract (100%) demonstrated antihyperglycemic activity in mice at an oral dose of 250 milligrams per kilogram, and at a dose of 500 milligrams per kilogram demonstrated hypoglycemic activity in mice (Gupta et al. 1984). The leaves are known to contain sesquiterpenes (Manchand and Blount 1978) and flavonoids (Kerr et al. 1981).

tored the movements of Venus closely and observed it in daytime. The positions of Venus and other planets were thought to influence life on Earth, so and other ancient Maya Mesoamerican cultures timed wars and other important events based on their observations. The Maya watched Venus carefully as it moved through its stations, appearing first after its conjunction with the Sun as a morning star in the sky, shortly before the sunrise, or after its upper conjunction, when it had appeared in the sky as an evening star shortly after the sunset. It takes 584 days for Venus and the Earth to line up in their previous position as compared to the Sun. It takes about 2922 days for the Earth, Venus, the Sun, and the stars to agree.

The Maya made daytime observations of Venus. Venus had a psychological effect upon the Maya and other Mesoamerican cultures, it has been shown that the Maya were timing some of their wars based on the stationary points of Venus and Jupiter. Humans were sacrificed when Venus was at its dimmest magnitude but they most feared the planet when it was its brightest.

# Migrating Shorebirds

One of the most common migratory birds seen on Ambergris Caye is the shore-bird. The tremendous importance of the strategy of migration to shorebirds cannot be overstated. Most shorebirds migrate long distances between their summer and winter homes. They are dependent upon at least three distinct habitats: their breeding habitat, non-breeding habitat, and stopover sites along the migration routes. They are physically designed for long-distance flight by their long wings and ability to build up and store fat.

All Arctic-nesting shorebirds migrate. The Arctic refers to that region of our



Killdeer is a well-known plover (shore bird) that ranges from southern Canada to South America. Its loud, shrill cry seems to say kill-deer. The bird is about 10 inches (25 centimeters) long, with a grayish-brown back and a white breast marked with two black bands. Killdeers build their nests in shallow depressions in fields. The female usually lays four black-spotted, buff-colored eggs. When a predator approaches a killdeer's nest or its young, the bird often tries to distract the intruder by dragging one of its wings as if it were broken. Killdeers eat many insects harmful to crops, and are protected by game laws.

The American Golden-Plover annually performs one of the longest migrations of any American bird. In late summer, birds from the eastern Arctic gather in eastern Canada, where they fatten on insects, crowberries and other small fruits before beginning their nonstop flight over the ocean to the northern coast of South America, a journey of some 2,500 miles (4,000 kilometers). Smaller numbers move southward in the fall across the Great Plains. Relatively few American Golden-Plovers are found along the East Coast of the United States. Once in South America they make another long flight across the vast Amazon Basin, finally arriving at their principal wintering grounds on the pampas of central Argentina and in Patagonia and Tierra del Fuego. In former times, they gathered there in enormous numbers, but heavy shooting in both North and South America took a serious toll, from which the species has not fully recovered. In spring, the birds return to the Arctic but at that time they move north by way of the Great Plains.


globe that is in the far north, generally north of the imaginary latitude line known as the Arctic Circle. Some shorebirds that breed in northern Alaska spend the winter as far away as southern Chile. Some plovers, curlews and tattlers fly non-stop from Hawaii and other Pacific islands to Alaska, a distance of over 3,500 miles, in two or three days. Many species of shorebirds form large flocks for the long migrations between North America and South America.

Not all shorebirds migrate all the way

to the arctic. Some, like the American avocet, migrate north from west Mexico to breed at the Great Salt Lake in Utah, USA. Wilson's phalaropes travel from South America to build nests in the prairie wetlands of the north-central United States and south-central Canada. Yet, other species such as piping plovers winter along the Gulf of Mexico and southern Atlantic coasts of the United States. Then, they migrate to the Great Lakes region, central United States, south-cen-

tral Canada, and the northern Atlantic coast to breed.

You can spot these birds along the shoreline, where troops of small birds scurry along the water's edge, looking for food. Shorebirds are more accurately described as birds of open land, including, but not limited to, the shore. Shorebirds include the sandpipers, plovers, oystercatchers, snipes, and stilts, among others. Shorebirds are not seabirds (such as terns or gulls), waterfowl (such as ducks), or wading birds (such as herons or egrets). Most shorebirds are small, like a sparrow or medium-sized like a robin, with slender bills for probing in the mud or sand and slender legs for wading. Hundreds of different patterns on these birds make it almost impossible to identify. Don't be discouraged, just try to answer, is it a sandpiper or plover? Plovers are generally smaller than sandpipers with shorter, thicker bills and have a behavior of run and stop, run and stop looking for food in the wave action on the beach. They eat crustaceans and small marine life as they go. Sandpipers have longer, slimmer bills and behave more independently than the flocking plovers. They are generally taller and are in a different family called Scolopacidae. Plovers are in a family known as Charadriidae. The Black-necked Stilt, as you might remember



The Ruddy Turnstone is a bird of both the Old and New Worlds. Ruddy Turnstones travel from their Arctic nesting grounds to coastal wintering grounds from the southern United States to South America. Range-wide, they winter along the coastlines of every continent except Antarctica.

from Bubba's 'Idiots Guide to Ornithology', has a black neck and looks like it is walking on stilts.

Shorebirds on Ambergris include the Black-necked Stilt, American Golden Plover, Wilson's Plover, Semipalmated Plover, Snowy Plover, Black-bellied Plover, Collared Plover, Ruddy Turnstone, Killdeer, Spotted Sandpiper, Bairds, Solitary Sandpiper, Upland Sandpipper, Least Sandpiper, Western Sandpiper, Pectoral Sandpiper, Stilt Sandpiper, Short-billed **Dowitcher, and the Common Snipe.** 

Migration is a mysterious topic. We know that shorebirds are physically designed for long, rapid flight with their long, pointed wings, but what about how they find their way? How do birds, fish, mammals, and insects travel the immense distances they do with such exactness? How do first year shorebirds, traveling without their parents, find their way south for the first time? Some migratory animals travel at night, some during the day, some in the skies, and others deep within the sea. Yet, unerringly, they locate habitats necessary for the continuation of their species. Scientists have proposed that migrants use the stars, the sun, and even the Earth's

magnetic field for guidance. Some animals seem to use smell, as the salmon apparently do to guide them from the vast ocean to the particular stream of their birth. Most probably, migrating species use a combination of means (e.g., senses, celestial clues and landmarks, instinct) to guide this most important journey of their lives.

# Reef Brief

Nassau Groupers: Morphology and Life History



Nassau Groupers have the ability to change color to camouflage themselves with their surroundings

As part of Green Reef's Nassau Grouper Research and Advocacy Campaign, this week's Reef Brief highlights the morphology and life history of this important commercial species.

Nassau Groupers are generally identified by four to five irregular dark stripes on a pale tan or gray body, black dots around their eyes, a large black saddle patch on their tail and a wide "tuningfork" pattern on their forehead. They grow to lengths of approximately three feet and weigh around 55 pounds. As adults, these top-level predators are usually found near shallow, high relief coral reefs and rocky bottoms to depths of 90 meters. They have the ability to change color to camouflage themselves with their surroundings.

Nassau Groupers exhibit no sexual dimorphism in body shape or color, so it is impossible from a glance to determine if a particular fish is male or female. They possess some degree of protogynous hermaphroditism, which means they change from female to male when they are between 300 and 800 millimeters long.

Adult Nassau Groupers generally eat

a diet of mainly fish (parrotfish, wrasses, damselfish, squirrelfish, snapper and grunts). Juveniles, on the other hand, eat a diet composed mainly of crustaceans (crab, stomatopod, hermit crab, panulirid lobster, and caridean and panaid shrimp). These juvenile groupers are usually found around coral clumps covered with macroalgae and over sea grass beds.

Nassau Groupers, as are many other type of groupers and coral reef fishes, are solitary during most of the year and then come together to spawn in large aggregations. These aggregation banks are site specific, usually in 20-40 meters of water at specific locations at the outer reef shelf where temperatures are between 25-26 degrees Celsius. In Belize, Nassau Groupers have historically aggregated around the full moons of December and January in groups that can contain upwards of several thousand individuals. During these aggregations, the female groupers produce planktonic eggs that are fertilized externally. The reproductive success of the eggs is thought to be affected by predators and currents.

# Boil up

#### Ingredients:

\*2 lbs. fish \*1 tsp. salt \*2 pieces yams \*2-3 medium coco \*1 stick cassava \*1 small pig's tail (trim off fat) \*3-4 green bananas (sliced) \*2 firm ripe plantains (sliced) \*2 sweet potatoes \*2 eggs

#### Method:

- \*Scrape fish and clean with lime juice.
- \*Peel ground foods and cut into small pieces (about 3" in length).
- \*Add all ground foods and boil until fork tender. Set boil cake on top of ground foods.
- \*Remove from pot.
- \*Cook fish in water in which ground foods was cooked. When tender, remove from water. Boil eggs. Cool in cold water and remove from shells. Use as garnish.
- \*Serve with tomato sauce.

# **Boiled cake** *Ingredients:*

\*2 cups flour \*2 tsps. baking powder

\*1/2 -3/4 cup water

#### Method:

- \*Mix all ingredients together.
- \*Knead and make into 5"-6" size flatten.
- \*Boil on top of ground foods. (Boil on each side for about five minutes.)
- \*Test for doneness with fork. Fork should come out dry.

#### Ingredients:




