Birds of San Pedro – wonders of the sky



Climbing up the stairways to the lofty perch at Caribbean Villas leads to some amazing views and great sightings.

Everyone knows that San Pedro offers great diving, snorkeling and other watersports. With all the great physical sports available, one particularly fun and relaxing activity that is often overlooked is bird watching. From the only bird perch in San Pedro, located at Caribbean Villas, one can take in breathtaking views of the abundant foliage on the resort's grounds, plus a 360 degree view of surrounding San Pedro.

The Caribbean Villas is a destination worthy of a visit, it has one of the most spectacular views, as well as a host of endemic birds and other animals that call this resort their home. Watching birds in this area, while seemingly slow and time consuming, can ultimately be rewarding to the most patient of bird watchers. The thick vegetation of Caribbean Villas, and the typical, quick, seemingly random movements of many birds, makes them often difficult to see. Early morning and late afternoon are excellent times to bird watch, as most bird species are feeding or moving to new locations. Manager, Beth Rogers stated, "among our amenities and excellent service, we try to keep our guests wanting more and the perch is just a treat to them." She further stated

that at any given instance, bird enthusiasts get a chance to watch an average of six to seven different species in one visit.

Visitors to the bird perch will be fascinated by the hustle and bustle of activities taking place around them. Bird watching is an activity as old as humanity and for good reason! Birds are a beautiful and diverse group of animals often easier to view compared to other creatures. While a "rare bird" may be an exciting discovery, watching the behavior of the most common birds can also be fascinating and informative. After all, birds common to one region may be considered rare in another. Careful observational skills are necessary to be accurate when trying to identify a bird. The way the bird flies or acts may be as important as noticing the color of the feathers. The size and shape of the birds' body, wings, head, feet, and beak are very important. The sounds you hear the bird make and the location in which you see it are also important. The habitat in which a bird is found and the time of year can give you important clues when trying to solve the mystery of the unidentified flying crea-

The Caribbean Villas has always had a strong collection of bird species, from parrots and macaws, to herons and sparrows, to near shore birds, including the ever popular seagulls. There is a healthy population of warblers in this location, they take the skies together and survive together. At any given time, an unpredictable number of species can be spotted. Other exciting and endangered species of birds that can be seen at this location include; the olive sparrow, fly catchers, brown jays,

hummingbirds, orioles, kiskadees and robins. These species all share one thing in common, the natural, lush, thick vegetation that is filled with food and nesting areas. Other interesting and/or threatened species include the Roseate Spoonbill, the great egret and sandpipers. If you are lucky, you can get a first hand look at the Black Catbird. This makes for a wonderful moment as this specie is rare. The species of hummingbirds that inhabit the area are gorgeous; it is always fascinating to observe the tiniest of birds with wing beats of



Barstool Bird Watching



Try watching some birds from your favorite perch, the barstool! Now you have

a barstool, and ever so often, I find myself back on that stool gazing over the Caribbean.

Chico is my favorite bartender on the island, partly because he makes excellent conch ceviche and partly because

I first discovered bird watching from of his tolerance of my antics. One afternoon while warming the stool, he asked me how I found the time to bird watch enough in order to write my weekly column on birds.

> I explained how bird watching for some is not a planned event and that



A Royal Tern is a large, crow-sized bird with a long, heavy, yellow-orange to orange-red bill, black cap, wispy crest, white forehead, and pale gray back and wings. The tail is moderately forked. The Royal Tern breeds in large, dense colonies. Nests are sometimes washed away by storm tides, but the birds usually make a second attempt, often at a new location. This bird has fewer young than other terns, but maintains its numbers wherever it has protection from disturbance. It feeds almost entirely on small fish, rather than the crustaceans and insects taken by most other terns.

birds are always around us. We merely have to stop time and look!

He looked at me strange and asked if I would like another beer.

I could tell he did not fully understand bird watching, so I enticed him into a round of "barstool bird watching" with a challenge, "I can identify more birds than you without leaving my stool!"

I knew from watching Chico play dominos that he enjoyed gaming, so I bet a round of drinks for the bar. Luckily, "Tequila Steve" had left us with some binoculars, and the afternoon was

Chico washed his chopping block in the bar's sink and began to sharpen his knife, peering out the windows overlooking the shoreline. "I see frigates," he said, "... five of them! Flying around the fishing boats."

I explained how each species only counted for one sighting, and the score was Chico - 1, Elbert - 0, Bubba - 0. After a few other declarations of the rules. Chico agreed to include Bubba's sightings if he barks first.

Chico began to chop a large, white onion. Two little ground doves were bobbing for sand flies just off the veranda. "Doves!" he yelled, "That's two for me!" "What kind of doves," I asked. "Little doves!" he responded.

We talked a while about the rules stating "species." He opened me another beer, and I conceded his score of "little

Chico - 2, Elbert - 0, Bubba - 0.

Chico had just settled down and started chopping the conch into bite sized cubes when Bubba suddenly jumped up from his nap in the doorway, ran across the lobby and barked across the street at the breadfruit tree, startling two white-winged doves to fly away.

Chico - 2, Elbert - 0, Bubba - 1.

Before I could swivel around in the bar stool to face the shoreline again. Chico had Peterson's Field Guide in his hand and was yelling, "Magnificent Frigate and the Great Frigate. If Bubba can count two kinds of dove, I can count the Great Frigate. That's three for me, one for Bubba, and you don't have zip!"

As fast as I could rattle them off, I took the lead with "Royal Tern, Brown Pelican, Yellow-headed Pelican and Neo-tropical Commorant."

The game's momentum was interrupted by Chico's calling foul on my commorant sighting. "It's underwater," I explained. After a few minutes of studying the surface of the waters around the dock, a commorant surfaced its head with a wiggling eel in its beak and began swallowing. "You're lucky," Chico said in a low voice, "That's four for

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Barstool Bird Watching

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The Brown Pelican is a very large, stocky bird with a dark brown body and a long flat bill, and is the only non-white pelican in the world. Adults have a whitish head, with dark brown on the hind neck during breeding season. Young birds have dark brown head and whitish bellies. These social colonial birds fly in single file, low over the water. When sighting prey they plunge with wings half-folded, from heights of up to 50 feet (15 meters), surfacing to drain water from their bills before swallowing the fish. Unlike its larger white relative, the Brown Pelican seldom soars. Around waterfronts and marinas individual birds become quite tame, taking fish offered them by humans.

In fourteen hundred ninety-two (1492), Columbus sailed the ocean

blue and history knows him best for this voyage when he landed in the Caribbean and discovered the New World. Columbus was convinced that he had landed in the Far East. However, he had bumped into America and as such, secured a spot for himself into history books for the rest of time.

Christopher Columbus was born in Genoa, Italy somewhere between August and October of 1451. Columbus's father, Domenico, was a weaver and also somewhat involved in local politics in Genoa. Columbus had four younger siblings and became close friends with his younger brother Bartolomeo. Columbus's education may not have been very thorough, but he did learn to read and write.

As a young boy, Columbus started out working with his father in weaving, but soon turned to sailing. Genoa is a seaport in Italy so Columbus grew



up by the sea and among many sailors. He spent his teenage years first as a cabin boy then as a sailor; learning much about sailing, astronomy, and geography through his voyages. During his twenties, Columbus settled down in Lisbon with his brother Bartolomeo where he helped him in his map-making business. During this time, Columbus also captained ships for Italian merchants.

In 1478, Columbus met and married a young woman named Felipa who came from a relatively respected family. He then moved with her family to Porto and there Felipa gave birth to a son, whom they named Diego. Soon after Diego was born, Felipa died. The years following Felipa's death were filled with ocean voyages. Columbus moved to Portugal where he had connections with the Portuguese court through Felipa's family. It was during these years that Columbus began to develop the idea that he could reach the Far East by sailing west. Through his study of geography and his knowledge gained in map-making, Columbus began to believe that the earth was round. He read about Marco Polo's trip over to the Far East, and the spices and riches there. Columbus began to believe he could reach the Far East by sailing west.

Convincing someone to provide for such a voyage across the Atlantic was not very easy. Columbus used his connections into the Portuguese court to ask King John II to provide for his trip across the Atlantic. However, King John rejected his request. Both France and England also refused to provide for his voyage. Co-

move with his son to Spain. Columbus was known to be a dedicated Christian and in Spain he formed connections with monks, who were scholars. Through his connections he eventually met Fray Juan Perez, Queen Isabella's confessor with whom he had many discussions. Perez eventually introduced Columbus to King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella and after a few years and many petitions, Columbus got patronage for his voyage from Ferdinand and Isabella.

Columbus was given three ships, the Niña, the Pinta, and the Santa Maria. Recruiting a crew courageous enough to sail across the Atlantic was difficult but was managed. On August 3rd, 1492, three ships left Spain to find the Far East. His first voyage began from Spain, and on October

lumbus then made the decision to 11th, 1492, they landed on an island they called Guanahani, but Columbus later renamed it San Salvador. While exploring the islands in the area and looking for gold to loot, Columbus' men traveled to the islands of Hispaniola, Cuba and many other smaller islands.

> On his second, larger expedition from September 25th, 1493 to June 11th, 1496, Columbus sailed with 17 ships and 1,200 to 1,500 men to find gold and capture Indians as slaves in the 'Indies'. Columbus established a base in Hispaniola and sailed around Hispaniola and along the length of



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CASTOR BEAN PLANT

Oil Nut (English) Ricino, Higuera (Spanish) Xcoch (Maya)

Scientific Name: Ricinus communis L.

Plant Family: Euphorbiaceae

Description: Erect shrub or small tree to six meters tall; trunk to four centimeters in diameter; leaves deeply lobed, 10-60 centimeters across; flowers in a spike, purple brown in color; fruits brown, 1.5-2.5 centimeters long; seeds black or mottled brown-creme, each 10-17 millimeters long.

Habitat: Old fields, roadsides, edge of forest, gardens.

Traditional Uses: Seeds and leaves



The Castor Bean plant is used very effectively as a purgative, emollient, laxative, and to treat cuts, sores, swellings, to prevent scarring from measles, and for common women's problems.

have been used since ancient times as a *purgative* and *emollient*. Boil half of a leaf, plus five dried seeds in two cups water for five minutes and drink warm as a *purgative*. Use half leaf plus two seeds in same manner as a *laxative*. Crush fresh leaves into paste to apply to *cuts*, *sores* and *swellings* to improve healing time. For *pain*, heat a large leaf in oil and apply to

area as a poultice overnight. For headaches and sinus congestion, apply small amount of "Vicks" to forehead; wrap with castor leaf; tie with cloth and lie down for one hour or use at bedtime. Boil five large leaves in two gallons water for ten minutes to bathe children with measles (alleviates itching and prevents scarring). Steam from boiled leaves is used as

a vaginal treatment for female disorders (e.g., vaginal tract infections and post childbirth pains). For fevers, heat leaf in oil; rub over body and wrap up warm overnight.

Research Results: The seeds, and to some extent the foliage, are poisonous, containing the compound rich (Kingsbury 1964). Ricin is said to have "many of the poisonous characteristics of a bacterial toxin" (p.194) and pure ricin is one of the most poisonous compounds known. Heat inactivates the ricin (a protein) contained in the seeds (Farnsworth 1993). An ethanol-water (1:1) extract of the leaf showed antiviral activity at a concentration of 50 mcg/ml against Vaccinia virus (Dhar et al. 1968). An ethanol (95%) extract of the leaf showed galactagogue effect at a dose of 3.75 ml/person (Gilfillan

Ingredients:

Corn Mixture:

- *1 lb ground corn
- *1/2 small round recado
- *2 tbsp water

Fish Mixture:

- *8 oz. cooked fish flaked and checked
- *2 small onions (finely chopped)
- *1 tsp salt
- *1/2 tsp dried oregano
- *1/2 tsp thyme
- *2tbsp margarine

Method:

*Prepare corn by dissolving recado in water.

- *Add to ground corn. Mix with clean hands.
- *Take small pieces and make in small balls about 1-1/2" to 2" in size. *Flatten balls on a piece of clear plastic (Plastic from bread bag is suitable).
- *Add about a teaspoon of fish filling. Fold over corn (as if making patties).
- *Seal edges well. Fry in deep, hot fat. Turn once.

Dressing a Mollusk

Mollusks have been the proud owners of seashells for 600 million years when bacteria, protozoans, and organic debris facilitated the development of marine invertebrates. Humans have enjoyed the economic and aesthetics benefits of shells for ages often without questioning their creation. Malacology, the study of mollusks helps explain the complex development of this organism's fashionable armor.

Mollusks possess many diverse forms of pigment in both body and shell. Colors and patterns are formed according to the animal's diet. The nutrients from the food eaten are broken down as they travel through the bloodstream towards the mantle, where they are transformed into highly concentrated cells. The mollusk uses these cells for the colouration and pigmentation of the structural layers of its shell.

Indigo, blue, red, and yellow shell colors are common because of the basic pigments, melanins and porphyrins. These pigments build up intermittently along the mantle edges and are responsible for dashed, dotted, clustered, and striped designs. Colouration is affected by changing water conditions and increases in salinity or pollution.

The organic composition of seashells includes several layers of crystalline calcium compounds. These layers are protected by an outer sheath frequently called the periostracum. The periostracum often helps with camouflage and is made possible by the chemical content of the animal's blood. The mantle concentrates calcium by an osmotic process and crystallization

The shells of the mollusks are often beautiful and multicolored, and the empty shells are sought after by shell enthusiasts worldwide.

takes place immediately between the existing shell layer and namtle cavity, creating a prismatic structure.

Seasonal growth is observed by lines and breaks on body whorls. During active growth periods the mollusk dissolves unwanted spines or projections which might hinder feeding or movement. Shells develop rapidly in tropical areas, thickening with age, but remain unchanged once the animal is sexually mature. Abnormally large

shells therefore imply a severe parasitic infestation, where the mollusks' sexual organs have been destroyed and so shell growth has not been inhibited. The great diversity of shapes and colors in seashells indicates natural selection, and an attempt to increase chances of survival.

TURTLE UPDATE: The total number of turtle nests recorded this season equaled thirty-eight, only five of which were false crawls.

southern Cuba. He spotted and named the island of Dominica on November 3rd, 1493.

On a third expedition that took place between May 30th, 1498 to October 1500, Columbus sailed farther south to Trinidad and Venezuela. His fourth and last expedition took place on between May 9th, 1502 to November 7th, 1504; Columbus sailed to Mexico, Honduras and Panama.

At the end of his days, Columbus had made many great discoveries and done many great things. However, he lost all of his titles. Although he did die rich, he was never given full credit for all he had done in the Caribbean. On May 20th, 1506, he died in the city of Valladolid of a disease he had caught in the Caribbean. Even though Columbus did not get everything he should have, he introduced the Old World to a New World. He himself never knew the extent of his discovery, but now that it is known he has received credit. The legendary voyage made in 1492 created new lives for many as they came to America.

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


