

Reef Brief Contributed by Peace Corps Volunteer Nicki Vassak

As many are aware, the lobster season officially close next month on the 15th. A close relative of lobster, the shrimp, also occupies an important niche in the Belize fishing industry. Through the years, the spotlight has been on the shrimp industry as many local restaurant and hotel owners have voiced their concerns regarding the amount of shrimp made available for domestic sale. The increasing demand for shrimp in Belize has led to the arrival of many commercial shrimp aquaculture operations over the past decade. Aside from its importance as an export, as well as its appeal as a seafood delicacy, shrimp also possess a valuable role in the coral reef ecosystem and are linked to one of the most endangered of marine crea-

Throughout the world there are over 2,000 species of shrimp that are found in shallow and deep ocean, as well as in freshwater lakes and streams. In addition to lobster, shrimp are closely related to crabs and cravfish. A semitranslucent body, as well as a flexible mid-section and fanlike tail, characterizes these creatures. Shrimp have evolved appendages allowing them to be skilled swimmers, as well as long antennae that assist in signaling approaching danger or potential prey. Most

shrimp species range in length from three millimeters to more than 20 centimeters, with larger species known as

Tropical species, such as the mantis shrimp, can grow to be 55 centimeters. This species is often brightly colored and searches out a safe habitat in the crevices of rocks and coral. Hiding from predators also allows the mantis shrimp to lie in wait for passing prey. When the antennae of this shrimp signal that prey, such as fish or crustaceans are near. the shrimp lunges and grabs its prey with miniature claws. Another warm water

species is the coral shrimp, which feeds on tiny plants and animals and is also known for its symbiotic behavior of cleaning the debris from the scales of coral fish.

Shrimp reproduction varies with each species, but generally the male shrimp fertilizes the larger female, after which the female lays anywhere from 1,500 to 14,000 eggs! The female usually guards the mass of eggs for a few weeks until they hatch and larvae emerge. After passing through five different stages of development, the larvae become mature shrimp.

It is these mature shrimp that are targeted by shrimp trawls throughout the world. A trawl is essentially a fish netting device that is dragged along the ocean floor. In the early part of the decade, shrimp trawling became newsworthy when it was noted that the decline of sea turtles was linked to trawling; trawls were not only collecting shrimp, but also sea turtles. Since then, it has become mandatory that all trawls be equipped with a Turtle Excluder Device (TED), allowing sea turtles to escape from the nets.

In Belize, where there were once 11 trawls, now only five remain, all of which are reported to have TEDs. The primary area of trawling in Belize includes Victoria Channel and south of Belize City to Placencia. There has been a general decline in annual shrimp harvests which is likely due to overexploitation, despite a regulated closed season of April 15th - October 31st.

The Coastal Zone Management Authority and Institute is concerned with the current shrimp population and recommends that not only should the closed season be revised, but shrimping must be prohibited within a specified distance from the shoreline. In addition, it seems likely that commercial aquaculture facilities will continue to increase in an attempt to compensate for decreasing natural stocks.

Creature!



Tailless Whipscorpions (Amblypygi) are a small and understudied group of arachnids characterized by long antenniform legs and raptorial pedipalps. An amblypygid is an invertebrate animal belonging to the order Amblypygi in the class Arachnida, in the subphylum Chelicerata of the phylum Arthropoda. Amblypygids are also known as Whipspiders. The name "amblypygid" means "blunt rump," a reference to a lack of the telson ("tail") carried by related species. Although the Tailless Whipscorpion belongs to the Arachnid class, it is neither spider nor scorpion, but something in-between. At first glance this handsome specimen, Phrynus parvulus (Arachnida: Amblypygi) looks like a spider, and is very common in Belize.

Amblypygids live in tropical and subtropical regions throughout the world and during the day can be found in holes under rocks and stones which they dig using their large pedipalps. They are also found in rock crevices, under rotten logs, in plant debris and in caves. Typically only one individual resides in a crevice; however, it has been noted on a few different occasions a crevice being inhabited by both a male and a female. There can often be up to 13 or more different individuals residing on one tree trunk.



Amblypygids may range from 5 to 40 mm. Their bodies are broad and highly flattened, and most are dark red in color. They have a large pair of grasping appendages near the mouth, called pedipalps, that have many sharp spines. The prey is seized between the two pedipalps and are used to hold and crush the prey between special teeth on the inside of the trochanters (the second segment of the leg) of the

front legs. The meal is then transferred into the chelicerae (jaws). The first pair of legs has evolved into sensory, tactical appendages, and are long, delicate, and whip-like, with many fine hairs. Amblypygids often move about sideways on their six walking legs, with one "whip" pointed in the direction of travel while the other probes on either side of them. Prey is located with these "whips" and at the end of the abdomen is a whip-like, sensory structure called a flagellum.

Due to their nocturnal habits, secretive nature and geographical distribution there have been very few studies of feeding behavior in this group. It is known that they are purely nocturnal hunters feeding mostly on insects such as cockroaches and grasshoppers, though they also eat worms and slugs. They spend the daylight hours in holes under rocks and stones which they dig using their large pedipalps.

Interactions among individuals seem to be relatively rare and are usually between two males (aggressive interactions) or between males and females residing in the same crevice. When males meet in the absence of a female, they seem to have a ritualized posturing display which involves opening one palp, raising their bodies in the air, and holding that position. However, if a female is involved, they engage in actual combat, locking their chelicerae and palps together and may fight more or less continually for more than an hour and a half

Although these animals may look extremely dangerous and frightening, they are in fact harmless. Unlike some spiders and scorpions, amblypygids do not have venom glands. They are rather docile creatures that are easily frightened. In response to potential threats, amblypygids use their speed for escape.



turn south just four miles. This easily accessible location allows visitors to make an easy day-trip whether they are staying on the Cayes or arriving by Cruise Ship. Once you arrive at the location, experienced guides will brief you on safety procedures for ATV handling, outline the route to be taken and issue protective gear and helmets.

Once you are properly prepared, it is now time to explore the jungles of Belize on trail laid out over 100 years ago by loggers in search of precious Mahogany trees. The tight fitting helmets block out the roar of the engines. Although thrilling at any speed, these ATVs will not reach speeds above 30 or 40 miles per hour and trail guides make sure guests are not reckless when exploring the back country.

The trails are a good mix of various challenging terrains leading to the stop of the day – the Maya Caves. The Mayan caves offer a huge expanse of under-

ground wonder. After adjusting your individual headlamp, you squeeze through the mouth of the cave that opens up into a huge auditorium of stalagmites and stalagtites. Among the crevices throughout the caves you will find amazing pottery and other remnants left behind by the Mayas between 900 and 1500 BC. These caves were considered portals to the underworld and used for important ceremonies to appease the Mayan Gods.

As you explore the cave, your capable guide Raymond Brakeman, describes the history and geographic details of the cave. Brakeman is among 20 guides working for Discovery Expeditions that grew up




The highlight of the ATV tour is to explore the Mayan Caves. Here the guides will show you Mayan pots and dishes that were left undisturbed since the Mayan left the area hundreds of years ago. The well informed Tour Guides share the history of the cave and even show ashes left from one of the last fires burned inside the cave centuries ago.

in Gracie Rock Village in Peccary Park. Brakeman explains that these caves even serve as a natural hurricane shelter for the residents of Gracie Rock. The cave is also shelter for many bats and other interesting creatures such as the Tailless Whipscorpion (see related story, Page 6).

After this stop, it is time to loop back to home base via jungle trails. Although the trails were muddy from a recent rain, the ATVs easily maneuvered the trails. The 4-wheelers are easy to drive with automatic transmissions – no clutch or gears to mess with.

The trails wind through the mountains, just tapping the surface of this four thousand acre park. Guides also offer tours in survival skills and soon will add a repelling adventure and "The Beast," a 10 ton amphibious vehicle that will traverse both land and water in the area. 



Preparing for a Day Trip



Visitors are advised to dress sensibly for daytrips, especially as many trips are done by boat. Ample sunscreen, proper clothing and shoes can make the trip much more comfortable.

The classic Boy Scout motto "Be Prepared" could not be better words of advice for those planning a day trip. Be it a day of fishing, Manatee watching, or a jungle trip to exotic Mayan Ruins, there are a few items you should not leave your hotel with out, and a few things to remember that will help assure that you have an enjoyable (and safe) experience. Although some of these tips may seem obvious, it is easy to over look them in the excitement of your anticipated adventure.

If you have reserved your trip through

your hotel or a tour business you will most likely have a voucher. Many of these businesses list on their vouchers what they recommend you bring. Chances are you will be traveling by boat and there are things you should prepare for. Please don't forget to bring your voucher when you board the boat. Many times folks have to sit and wait in the boat while someone boarding has to run back to their room to retrieve their forgotten voucher. Most excursions pick up people at the docks along the front beach and people who hold things up ultimately make the trip late. That said, if you are waiting to be picked up at 7:00 a.m. don't panic at 7:30 that you missed the boat. Chances are your charter was held up for a dozen different reasons. When a boat does arrive, be sure to find out where it is going, as there are several different tour companies and tours offered on the island.

If you are transported by motorboat, you can expect wind, sun and sea spray. The combination of all three can leave you feeling like you just tangoed

plan on tying it back, braiding it is even better. Hats are always a good idea, but if you cannot secure it on your head. you should be prepared to fish it out of the sea on the first good breeze that comes along. Don't forget sunscreen, and if you are swimming during the trip you should reapply often. Even on a cloudy day the sun can filter through, and with the reflection on the water you can get a lot of sun without realizing it.

If you have long hair, If you are wearing shorts don't forget to apply sunscreen to the tops of your legs and feet, you will be in a sitting position on the boat and these sensitive "haven't seen the light of day" areas tend to burn fast. Most boats do not have rest rooms, so be sure to take care of business before boarding, or you may find yourself in an embarrassing "over-the-boat" moment. Remember, many of the rides into the main land take well over an hour

What's in a boat name?



Boats are a normal sight around our clear waters, but have you ever wondered what the story is behind their names? Having picked out a boat, most captains then have the difficult task of naming the boat. Many take the obvious route, naming the boat after their wife, sisters and/or a loved one. Some however, let their imaginations run wild and end up choosing some intriguing, original names that just grab your attention.

Many captains entertain classic superstitions, regardless of whether friends and family will be embarrassed or offended by the name chosen. Giving a boat/vessel a name is steeped in tradition and history and the reasons are practical, as well as sentimental. According to a survey conducted in the United States, many boaters claimed they named their boats/vessels by special women in their lives. Anthropologists have found that in addition to attesting to the relationships fishermen have with wives, girlfriends and daughters, fishers also choose names that project hope for 'victories' and successes at

Nowadays, naming a boat has grown into a ceremonial act, known as a christening. Whether it is a ship in a large fleet or a smaller, personal watercraft, receiving a name is a necessity, according to mariner tradition. The ancient Egyptians allegedly began the tradition of naming boats

centuries ago on the Nile River, and boat owners have been racking their brains ever since for the perfect boat name. If you want to get boat owners talking, ask them how they arrived at the name they gave their boat. In fact, most will confess that they spent far more time thinking about a perfect name for their boat than for their own children.

It's interesting to note that there are superstitions in the boat naming process as well. One superstition in particular revolves around whether or not it is okay to rename a previously-owned boat. It is believed that if a boat owner would change the original name of the boat, that the individual would have bad luck such as having motor problems, or investing a whole bunch just to make it a good working horse.

Another superstition holds that

since a boat's name allegedly reflects its personality, then the name should always have a positive spin. In other words, it is a case of "what you name is what you get." An owner may think that bestowing the name of "Last Dollar" is a humorous way to reflect how much money has been invested in the boat; however, those who believe in this superstition would say that the boat will ultimately be more trouble

than pleasure.

One of the more telling findings about the naming process is that boats named after people most often show relationships of the fishers' own choosing, rather than inherited relationships. Names used, more often than not, pertain to wives, girlfriends, daughters or friends or are composites of several names (boat captain's choosing), rather than to mothers or sisters (inherited). It's

also an interesting note that naming a boat after a significant other is slightly more popular than naming it after children.

This naming process also seems to be deeply ingrained in the commercial fisherman's psyche. Many believe it is a smart marketing move to name your boat after your company, and instill your brand at every port. Even then, the boats usually have an individual name as well. Some boat owners claim that when a boat is named and christened, energetically, it has been enlivened, and from that point on must be treated with the same respect as we would a person.

The San Pedro Sun made an attempt to get comments from our local boat owners in San Pedro. Our task was made easy as the boat owners were willing and more than pleased to have their boats featured in our survey. So, with all said, we can attest to the fact that the names of boats do indeed have a story or distinct meaning to their owners. After all, to many of them, their boats are part of their passions and dreams so why shouldn't they have names that help them define who they are and what they enjoy? and can be on choppy waters. Early morning trips can be a bit chilly, and a light, long-sleeved shirt can provide warmth, as well as sun protection. Depending on the weather there can be a good amount of sea spray, so it is possible that what ever you wear and bring along might get wet. Zip lock bags work great to protect your valuable camera and other items. Of course, a beach towel is a must as well. Don't worry about getting a little wet, just sit back and enjoy the refreshing sea spray while taking in the transparent azure waters.

If you are on a snorkeling trip you should be sure that a) you have your equipment, b) you rented equipment or c) the tour is providing you with equipment. If you are a first time snorkeler remember that the guides are there to help you, they are pro's at this. If you are fishing, find out in advance what, if anything, you are expected to bring. Again, most fishing boats provide the poles and bait.

Many of the day trips offer jungle excursions to near-by Mayan Ruins or to the Caves Branch River for some incredible cave tubing. On any trip that involves walking, the rule of thumb is "sensible shoes." You will be walking

Dr. Herman Smith was the only PhD archeologist to reside in Belize. He was noted in his field as a foremost researcher and expert in the coastal trading of the Maya and headed the archaeological development of Lamanai in Belize. Herman discovered and contributed much to the body of knowledge of the Maya once living on Ambergris Caye. If asked about this subject, he would gladly inform his listeners of the Maya past with detailed length and expansive arm waving. He lived in Belize for over 12 years and eventually obtained Belizean citizenship. Archeological expeditions, particularly where excavations are involved, are almost never dull. Aside from the interaction between the various expedition members from diverse backgrounds, there are invariably exciting finds, blossoming summer romances and sometimes downright goofy behavior.

I learned years ago that I wasn't nearly such a good judge of character as I thought. When I sought volunteers for expeditions in Belize I got


it in my head that I could avoid complications by conducting personal interviews with potential participants. It only took one field season to demonstrate that I was better off trusting to blind luck.

One summer, we planned a twomonth long excavation of two Maya sights, on the north end of Ambergris Caye. Living conditions promised to be pretty rough as we would be living in tents, rationing fresh water and bathing in the salt water lagoon using Joy detergent. In addition to the heat, dirt, mosquitoes, Doctor Flies, scorpions and coconut crabs that loved to share tents with humans, there was the isolation in a small camp over twenty miles from running water and ice that I felt wouldn't be for anyone but the heartiest volunteer.

I needed sixty people to complete the crew and had selected fifty-eight when there was a polite knock on my office door. In walked two attractive women I guessed to be in their late thirties who were absolutely dressed to the nines. Dripping with diamonds and clutching their Gucci purses, they looked all the world as if they had just come from a fashion show or a meeting of the Junior League. It was clear that these ladies were from the privileged class, having gone to the right finishing schools and seen the best orthodontists from the time they were children. Both, it turns out, were di-

vorcees having recently parted company with their wealthy spouses and were ready for some real adventure. Instinct told me to hustle them out the door but as I listened to their enthusiastic pleas. I confess I weakened. They were, after all, well educated and not without charm. After a few minutes, I caved in. I decided to accept their applications, whereupon


on jungle pathways that can be slippery when wet and on surfaces that are uneven. A pair of tennis shoes or a fitted Teva-like sandal is your best bet, slip-on sandals and any kind of heel is a just a bad idea.

The larger tour companies, like SEArious Adventures and SEAduced, stock their boats with coolers full of soda pop, water, Belikin beer and if you are lucky, rum punch. Most guides are attentive and generous, if they have something you need or forgot they will gladly share or accommodate you as best as possible.

Last, but not least, always day-trip with a small amount of cash. Even if the land part of your trip includes meals, you may decide you want an additional beverage at the local restaurant or come across a trinket you can't live without. If you don't spend the cash on your trip, and you enjoyed your journey, your guide will certainly appreciate a tip. Remember that this is his job, and that he might do the same trip day after day during the peak tourist season. Was he enthusiastic, friendly and helpful? If so let him know you appreciate the way he shared his incredible world with you.



O Ambergris Caye

Ambergris Caye is twenty-five miles long; its width ranges from a few hundred feet to over four miles. Northern Ambergris Caye is separated from the southernmost tip of Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula by a small channel. After arriving in Belize City, a short fifteen minute airplane ride gets you to San Pedro, or if you would rather take the scenic route, an hour's boat ride will get you there as well.

O Language

English is the official language and is widely spoken, as is Spanish. Other languages include Creole, Garifuna, Mayan and German.

Belize weather is characterized by two seasons: a rainy and a dry season. Most of the year's rainfall occurs during the period of June to November, that is, the rainy season. The average temperature varies from 81°F/27°C along the coast to 69°F/21°C in the hills. The coldest month is January while the highest temperatures are experienced during the month of May.

Cash & Currency

U.S. dollars are accepted as currency countrywide. The common exchange ratio is \$2BZ/\$1 U.S. Licensed moneychangers offer a slightly higher exchange rate, ranging from \$2.05BZ to \$2.12BZ, depending on the current market

Nearly all hotels, restaurants and shops accept Visa, Master Card and travelers' checks. Street vendors and smaller establishments in remote areas may accept only cash or travelers' checks.

O Sales Taxes

Belize's sales tax is set at 9% and it is applied to all goods and services, except for telecommunications. There is a 9% hotel tax. Some hotels also add a 10-15% "service charge" to the bill; inquire about this when checking hotel prices.

O Transportation

The streets are sand, which is great for walking or bike riding. There are few cars; instead, the vehicles of choice are electric golf carts, which are available for rent. Please remember that all golf cart drivers MUST have a valid drivers license. Drive with caution, there are many speed bumps around the downtown area that are not marked and always be on the lookout for potholes. Taxi service is available everyplace south of Boca del Rio. Around town the average fee is \$7BZ. Some local business, as well as resorts, rent bicycles.

Telecommunications

All telecommunications services (direct dial phones, fax, telex, cable) are available. There are several "Internet Cafe's" on the island where you can access the internet through high-speed internet or satellite connections

- Caribbean Pork Chops



seeded chopped *2 tbsp. chopped fresh cilantro *3/4 tsp. cinna-*1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Directions:

Prepare marinade in gallon-size sealable plastic bag, combine pineapple juice, wine, 2 teaspoons oil, salt and pepper. Add pork chops. Seal bag. Refrigerate

at least 2 hours or overnight, turning bag over occasionally.

Prepare sauce, in small saucepan, heat remaining 2 tablespoons oil. Add onion and poblano pepper; cook, stir frequently 5 minutes until tender. Add remaining ingredients. Simmer 3 minutes.

Drain marinade into sauce. Bring to boil and simmer 10 minutes. Meanwhile grill chops 7 minutes on each side or until cooked through but still juicy. Serve each chop with sauce.
